

Cummins Area School JP Sports Day

On a warm, sunny Wednesday, September 24th, Cummins Area School proudly held its first stand-alone Junior Primary Sports Day.

The day began with a vibrant parade, with each team walking behind their house banner, carried by the Primary House Captains. Students then showcased their voices with the national anthem and spirited war cries, setting the tone for the day.

The first session featured four rotation events: Target Throw, Soccer Kick, Long Jump, and Vortex Throw. Each student's first two attempts were recorded for scoring, after which they enjoyed as many practice turns as time allowed until the buzzer sounded.

Following the tabloid events, excitement built for the 40m sprints, timed by the Year 10 students. A special highlight was Constable Ben, new to the town, who clocked students' speeds with a speed camera; one runner hitting an impressive 21 km/h!

After recess, the Year 2 students completed the Mini Marathon, designed to prepare them for the longer-distance events at the 3–12 Sports Day next year. Meanwhile, the Year Is tackled the Egg and Spoon Race with great persistence. Foundation students then paired up with their Year 12 buddies or upper primary helpers for the Three-Legged Race, showcasing plenty of creative running styles.

The track events continued with hurdle relays by year level, followed by energetic participation in Tunnel Ball, Over and Under, and Rob the Nest, before finishing with the Baton Relay. The crowd then gathered for the much-anticipated Tug of War. Miss Indiah's class triumphed in the Foundation competition, while Mrs Pilgrim's class took out the Year 1/2 battle. The final showdown saw the teachers claim victory against the parents.

To conclude the day, the house captains joined together for the presentation of results: Annabel Goldsmith and Coda Dreckow (Eyre), Lenny Minhard and Ziggy Minhard (Flinders), and Freya Puckridge and Xavier Bullard (Sturt). After tallying the scores from the morning events, the standings were:








Student Lunch Passes

Students leaving the school grounds during the lunch break must carry a LUNCH PASS. There are two types of passes.

1. REGULAR LUNCH PASS: These will be issued at the beginning of each year on the written request of parents.

These passes are for students returning to their own home for lunch regularly. This pass is not to be used to access local shops to purchase lunch.

They may be issued to cover one or more days each week.

2. SPECIAL LUNCH PASS: Students are sometimes required to leave school for particular reasons on isolated occasions e.g. hair cuts, personal shopping, lunch at a friends, or a birthday party.

For each occasion, the student requires **a written request from parents through Daymap**. Students will not be permitted to phone home during the day to access a lunch pass.

Students in Year 6 or younger must be accompanied by an adult when they leave the school grounds and have the written consent of their parents if the adult signing them out is not their parent.

Students in Year 7/8/ 9 must have written parental consent and be accompanied by another student the same age or older.

Students in Year 10 - 12 are able to leave the school grounds by themselves provided they have written parental consent. Our preference would be that they don't leave the school grounds alone.

All students who leave the school at Lunch time must sign out at the computer located at the Front Office. They must sign in on their return. This is an WHS requirement and applies to students with both Permanent and Daily Lunch passes.

This award aims to foster civic responsibility, empathy, and leadership among young people.

Eligibility

- Open to students in Years 7 to 10.
- · Students must have engaged in volunteering activities that serve the wider community,
- excluding roles tied to personal sporting clubs or teams.
- The award may be received once per student during their eligible years.

Award Details

- Presented annually at the end-of-year school assembly or community event.
- Nominations may be submitted by teachers, school staff, community members, or peers.
- Valued at \$400

Selection Process

• A panel comprising a representative from the Lower Eyre Council and the school will assess nominations.

Criteria

Nominees should demonstrate several of the following:

1. Community Engagement

 Volunteering in local initiatives such as environmental clean-ups, aged care support, community gardens, charity events, or civic projects.

2.Leadership and Initiative

- Taking the lead in organizing or promoting community service activities.
- Encouraging peers to participate in community efforts.

3. Positive Impact

- Making a measurable or visible difference in the community.
- Supporting inclusion across the school and community and considering vulnerable or underrepresented groups.

4. Personal Qualities

- o Demonstrates empathy, respect, reliability, and a strong sense of civic duty and pride.
- · Acts with integrity and shows a commitment to the common good.

5. Sustainability of Effort

- Shows ongoing commitment rather than one-off participation.
- Reflects a genuine interest in contributing to community wellbeing.

Examples of Eligible Activities

- Volunteering at aged care facilities or community centres.
- Assisting with local environmental or sustainability projects.
- Supporting community events (e.g., fundraisers, festivals, awareness campaigns).
- Helping at libraries, op-shops, or food banks.
- Participating in youth advisory councils or civic engagement programs.
