The entire JP team—classroom teachers, NIT teachers, and SSOs—have invested considerable time and energy into this initiative. We eagerly anticipate seeing the day unfold and warmly invite parents to join us for this special celebration.

Swimming Program Update

Unfortunately, the swimming pool upgrade has encountered slight delays, making our original plan of conducting swimming lessons in Weeks 2 and 3 of Term 4, followed by Swimming Carnival, impossible. Given the updated timeline and considering the complexity of hosting events late in Term 4—when many students have departed and harvest season is in full swing—we've made the difficult decision to reschedule swimming lessons to Week 8 (pending pool completion) and cancel Swimming Carnival for 2025.

This decision wasn't made lightly and reflects both the seasonal demands of our community and the logistical challenges of running carnival events at year's end, only to repeat them early in Term 1. However, when we do return to the pool, it will be to a superb facility that will help create countless fond memories for our students in years to come.

BYOD Program Changes

Following extensive consultation with staff and Governing Council, we've decided to modify our BYOD program for 2026. From next year, we'll remove the expectation for families to provide devices for Year 7 students, instead implementing a hire system at \$200 per year.

Year 7 students will receive new HP devices featuring touchscreens and sufficient RAM/memory for all school programs. These devices can be taken home for homework and personal use with home internet access. This change aims to reduce financial pressure on families while allowing the school to maintain administrative rights—preventing students from downloading problematic programs like VPNs that circumvent our network filtering systems, addressing staff and parent concerns.

More detailed information will follow next term. For families with current Year 6 students, please note there's no need to budget for laptop purchases for next year's schooling. Don't hesitate to contact the school with any questions.

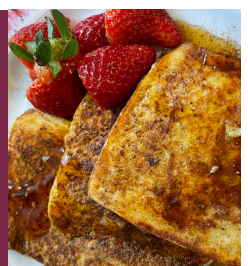
Remember that students will be dismissed one hour early due to term's end—school finishes at 2:15 pm on the last day. Enjoy this break with your children before the busy harvest season begins!

How volunteering and being of service make the world a better and happier place.

A Letter to Parliament from the Land

To the Honourable Members of Parliament,

Nurture me, as I have cared for you.

I am the land beneath your feet. The red earth, the rainforest, the reef. I am the mountain ranges that skim the sky and the desert plains that stretch endlessly. I am the mangrove coastlines where salt meets root. I am the wildflower blooms after rain in the Pilbara, and the cool canopy of the Daintree.

For tens of thousands of years, the First Peoples listened to me. They walked gently, lived in relationship with me, and cared for me with respect and reciprocity. They knew my seasons, read my winds, and moved with the rhythms of my tides.

Then came colonisation. With it, change—swift, unforgiving. New laws were imposed. A different legacy began, one that often sees me not as kin, but as commodity.

And yet, I tolerate. I remain a land of pride, beauty, and resilience.

My skin is your coast—crystal beaches, sunburnt cliffs, limestone arches weathered by time. Tourists flock to my edges, but my heart lies further in. In the quiet realm of the Gibson Desert. In the shadow of Uluru, where stories are carved in stone. In the hilly ridges where my snow gum lungs cling to granite. I am the wetlands of Kakadu, swarmed with crocodiles and brolgas. I am the Southern Ocean where whales breach and sing. My river veins, carry as much importance as your decisions made in office.

My skies are patrolled by wedge-tailed eagles and galahs. My forests echo with the calls of lyrebirds and the distant laughter of kookaburras. The koala curls into ancient eucalypts. The echidna burrows patiently. The Tasmanian devil prowls the shadows. These are not just creatures. They are my voice, my breath, my family. All my gifts are still here. Still offering. Still beautiful.

But hear this now: I am suffering.

I burn. My skin blisters in heatwaves and bushfires. My breath is choked with smoke. My waters—once flowing clear from spring to sea—are disrupted, dammed, and drying. My coral reefs, once a complex system of life, now bleach under warming seas. My forests are logged, and my animals—once plentiful—are vanishing. I am losing my balance. And when I fall, so too will you.

You sit in chambers of governance, under artificial light. I try to speak—in birdsong, in kangaroo tracks across the plains, in the silence after a storm—but too often, you do not hear me.

I acknowledge the efforts made. Some of you are listening. Some of you care. But I must ask, as plainly as I can: Do your actions match your intentions?

Please, hear me now.

I am more than a resource. I am your ancestor. I am your responsibility. The First Peoples have always known this. Their knowledge systems hold the wisdom of sustainable living—the blueprint for a future that honours all life.

I remember everything: the scars of colonisation, the acts of survival, and the long journey toward reconciliation and repair.

So, I ask—no, I plead: protect what remains. Restore what you can. Pass laws not just in the language of economics, but in the spirit of a meaningful supervisor.

Listen to the Elders. Learn Indigenous leadership. Prioritise ecosystems. Honour Country. Reconnect. Respect. Regenerate.

Let your legacy be one of healing.

I will not abandon you. But I ask, now more than ever: walk with me differently. Sit. Listen. Act. Write new laws—not just with pen, but with care.

Thank you.

Student Lunch Passes

Students leaving the school grounds during the lunch break must carry a LUNCH PASS. There are two types of passes.

1. REGULAR LUNCH PASS: These will be issued at the beginning of each year on the written request of parents.

These passes are for students returning to their own home for lunch regularly. This pass is not to be used to access local shops to purchase lunch.

They may be issued to cover one or more days each week.

2. SPECIAL LUNCH PASS: Students are sometimes required to leave school for particular reasons on isolated occasions e.g. hair cuts, personal shopping, lunch at a friends, or a birthday party.

For each occasion, the student requires **a written request from parents through Daymap**. Students will not be permitted to phone home during the day to access a lunch pass.

Students in Year 6 or younger must be accompanied by an adult when they leave the school grounds and have the written consent of their parents if the adult signing them out is not their parent.

Students in Year 7/8/ 9 must have written parental consent and be accompanied by another student the same age or older.

Students in Year 10 - 12 are able to leave the school grounds by themselves provided they have written parental consent. Our preference would be that they don't leave the school grounds alone.

All students who leave the school at Lunch time must sign out at the computer located at the Front Office. They must sign in on their return. This is an WHS requirement and applies to students with both Permanent and Daily Lunch passes.
